# Progressive Achievement Testing 2022

Dear Parent/Caregiver,

During weeks, eight, nine and 10 of this term, as well as week one of next term, the year two to ten cohorts will be completing online Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) in Maths, Reading Comprehension, Grammar & Punctuation and vocabulary skills. Each class will complete one twenty to forty minute test each week for the four weeks. These tests are a Departmental requirement for all public schools in South Australia. They are used Australia wide in both public and private sector schools. They are developed by the Australian Council for Educational Research and are thoroughly researched and normed test; the skills assessed by each question are mapped against the Australian Curriculum. Unlike NAPLAN, the PAT assessments do not have a specific student/parent report

- The Mathematics test is for years 2-10 and assesses the range of mathematical concepts and mathematical processes of understanding, fluency, problem-solving and reasoning.
- The Reading Comprehension test is for years 2-10 and measures and tracks student achievement in all
  aspects of reading comprehension, word knowledge and spelling.
- The Punctuation and Grammar test is for years 3-10 and is designed to assess students' understanding
  of the standard Australian English language conventions of grammar and punctuation.
- The vocabulary skills test is for years 4-10 and will assess the variety of student word knowledge and application across a range of contexts.

MDS will be using these results to help provide valuable and immediate data on student growth and to help teachers personalise learning to meet student needs. The tests provide teachers with objective information about students' skills so that realistic learning goals can be set and effectiveness of teaching strategies can be monitored. Teachers also use the results to track each student's development from year to year. This information is another useful tool for identifying students requiring extra support or extension in their studies.

The PAT testing process will be explained to all students prior to their commencement and should not be seen as a stressful "pass or fail" assessment. Students will be encouraged to view the tests as a way for teachers to learn more about their capabilities and then design learning programs that will help them improve.

We ask that Yr 6-10 students ensure that they have a fully charged laptop at school each day in order to ensure the smooth running of these tests.



# **Pastoral and School Care Worker News**



Recently, we were lucky to have the Red Cross visit MDS to provide presentations to our Yr. 5-12 students. The theme for the day was 'People Seeking Asylum'.

Our Yr 5-7 students participated in a presentation called 'In Search of Safety'. This program helped to build awareness for our students about people impacted by migration. It challenged them to think about who seeks asylum, why they seek asylum, where do these people go and once they have protection, what challenges do they face in a new country? It was great to see the level of empathy shown in the room and the amazing questions that our students asked during the presentation.

The Yr 8-12 students had a presentation called 'Pathways to Protection'. This looked at the difference between an asylum seeker, a refugee and a migrant and explored pathways to protection in a global and Australian context. The program helped to strengthen social inclusion and prepare students for an increasingly diverse society and a world where lives are affected by issues that exceed national boundaries. The presentation also looked at the relevant United Nations Conventions and global Human Rights obligations. Students were led through a scenario of an asylum seeker, having to make choices along the way of whether to leave their home or stay, go to the shore in the hope of finding a boat or go to a camp. It was interesting to see their choices and the reasons behind those choices!

Did You Know? Some interesting facts...

- Conflict and persecution forces one person from their home every 2 seconds
- Over half of the world's refugees are children
- Seeking asylum is a basic human right
- Less than 1% of people seeking safety come to Australia
- Currently, Turkey hosts most of the world's refugees...approximately 3.6 million
- Currently over 1 billion people are displaced by war and persecution in their country.
   This figure does not account for people displaced by climate change, natural disaster or environmental factors!

Presenters for the day, Karyn and Vanessa were thanked and presented with chocolates by Max and Darcy.



#### **Middle School News**

We are halfway through the term being Week 5 already. This is a great opportunity to remind students of their individual goals, check in with their academic progress and their overall wellbeing. Science Week has also been and gone.

Earlier this term students set two goals for themselves. One was a Learning Goal, focusing on the development of a skill, knowledge or capability, and the other a Performance Goal, focusing on the level of achievement in a selected subject task or area. The success of meeting these goals will be reflected upon in week 8 in preparation for Learning Conversations in Week 9. Due to the positive feedback given from last semester's Learning Conversations they will again be held online via video linkup on TEAMS. A more streamlined booking process is hoped to be in effect for this event with further details to be published in future newsletter updates.

Student academic progress is reviewed by teachers in Week 5 in the form of traffic lights. Teachers will be assigning either green, amber or red to their students to reflect progress 'At Standard', 'below Standard' or 'not yet At Standard with the chance of failure' respectively. Although not an official report card this data will be provided to students and families to support further discussion between students and their teachers to plot pathways to success.

The maintenance of positive personal wellbeing requires proactive actions by oneself and the sincere checking in by others. Students of Middle School age can at times think they have the skills and ability manage all feelings and emotions. This can result in internalisation and the hiding of important feelings and emotions, when sharing with a trusted adult would have better outcomes. I would encourage families to regularly check-in with the feelings and emotions of their student(s). Students should also seek out teachers who they trust to share with. At school we also have the lovely Di Nankivell, Pastoral and School Care worker. She is another point of contact for when things get a bit wobbly.

This year the theme for Science Week was 'Glass: More than meets the eye'. Middle School classes had opportunities to explore the use of light boxes and prisms to observe refraction and reflection of light. These phenomena underpin the function of fibre optics which we all rely on for global internet connectivity. Using glass to split light into its spectrum also gave an opportunity to discuss the difference between radio waves and gamma radiation.

Finally, the Middle School trip deposit letter will be sent home this week. Families should read the letter carefully as there is a bit of detail regarding the invoicing process. The itinerary for the trip as it stands will be available on the back of the letter.
