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Here we are over half way through the first term after a wonderful athletics carnival last Friday and a long weekend to recover. As I look to the calendar, the end of the term will be here all too quickly and there is much to achieve before then. Please note some significant dates in the diary section above.

In 2020 the authorities determined that Naplan tests would not be undertaken across the country; in 2021 students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 will once again be involved in Naplan online during over the course of Weeks 3 and 4 of Term 2. In order to ensure the efficacy of the system Australia wide, our students in these year levels will be undertaking a 'practice test' on Thursday March 25th. This is an omnibus test which combines reading, conventions of language and numeracy questions. Privacy information about this test is provided later in this newsletter for parents of students who will be participating. If you have any questions about the Naplan testing regime, please either check out the website ([NAPLAN Online – information for parents and carers](#)) or make contact with me at school. For parents who do not want their children to participate in Naplan, please contact me at the school prior to the end of term so that the appropriate withdrawal processes can be undertaken.

Later in this newsletter you will find a detailed report about our recent Athletics Carnival. Thank you to all the parents and families who made their way onto the Don Snook oval to support our students, and a particular thank you for adhering to our Covid Safe requirements. Many schools have not been able to invite families to participate in their school sports events, so we felt very lucky to have been able to have spectators. Craig Fitzgerald has provided his thanks to all those who supported the day, but I would like to particularly acknowledge his work in overseeing the organisation of the event. These days don't 'just happen' and Craig's attention to detail in preparing for and facilitating the day is outstanding. Another highlight was the work of our student house leaders whose efforts both before and during the day ensured high participation rates and a great spirit of competition and camaraderie – very well done House Leaders.

Late last year the Department for Education devised a policy regarding student use of mobile phones and personal devices and schools are required to implement this policy by the end of term 2, 2021. The Department's policy clearly defines differences in the policy between Primary and Secondary students, however in an area school this 'dividing line' is a little more fluid. At our next Governing Council meeting on Tuesday March 23rd, the mobile phone policy will be a topic for discussion. Currently our students are allowed to have mobile phones at school, however they are to be secured and not in use during the school day. If students need to use their phones for curriculum purposes; for example recording work photographically, or using them as a recording device for oral tasks, they may seek permission from the teacher with whom they are currently working and then return their

phone into their secure storage until the end of the day. We ask that parents who need to contact students during the school day, do so via the Front Office rather than sending messages via student phones. If you have any feedback about mobile phones at school we would welcome your input; either in person at the meeting, or via any of the GC members. Our policy document will be uploaded onto the school website once finalised and parents alerted via a future newsletter.

Australian media over the past week has inundated us all with issues about sexual assault and the concept of consent. In particular there have been calls for schools to do more regarding the education of young people around the topic of consent. All DfE sites are required to deliver the Child Protection Curriculum from 3 years of age to year 12. Within this curriculum, we cover age-appropriate material to provide students with information about feeling safe, respectful relationships, and intimate relationships including what constitutes consent. The SHINE program in particular, which deals with a number of the CPC key focus areas, provides our students with excellent information and seeks to have them explore their understanding of these topics. Schools however, can only do so much. Many of the ideas that students gain about sex and sexual relationships are reflections of the society in which we live; what our students observe on film and TV, on the internet and social media, and through the interactions they see around them in our community. If we are to ensure that our girls and our boys are equipped to engage in respectful relationships, then we are all responsible for providing them with support to develop healthy and safe relationships with others.

On Monday of Week 6, Di Nankivell and I had the great pleasure of accompanying a group of 20 students to Adelaide to participate in a Youth Leadership Conference. Under Covid-safe restrictions, we joined about 400 other students from schools across the state to listen to a range of young speakers who had all been on their own leadership journey. Our students, who ranged from Year 7 to Year 12, took a number of key messages from the day that I trust will inspire them in their own leadership aspirations. I certainly look forward to seeing them use what they have learned over the coming months and years.

After almost 10 years of service, our canteen manager Dale Harper has made the decision to move on and explore other career options. Dale has been a wonderful addition to our school, and she will be sorely missed. Dale will conclude her role at the end of Term 1 and thus we are currently embarking on the unenviable task of finding a replacement. Expressions of interest close at 12 noon on Friday March 26th. If you think this is an opportunity for you, or someone you know, please check out the details at the end of today's newsletter.

Oral language Confidence – Is there a more vital life skill?

Dear Parents/Caregivers,

This commentary is somewhat of an open letter/Op-Ed to all parents that I have felt increasingly compelled to write as more issues have arisen over past weeks involving MDS students. I feel that there is a significant lesson to be learned or at least reminded about, for all parents and educators regarding the need for our children to be confident, effective communicators. Please note, the purpose here is to highlight this issue rather than provide extensive background and definitive solutions.

Over the course of the last few weeks, I've become aware of three separate instances where a lack of **oral communication confidence**, in these instances amongst teen boys, led to them experiencing easily avoidable, potentially serious situations resulting in physical and emotional distress.

While I won't go into specific details the incidents, they each led to the students suffering varying degrees of quite unnecessary pain/discomfort, trauma, inconvenience, awkwardness and embarrassment. In writing this I am most certainly not attempting to apportion blame, especially not to the boys in question, however, each of these cases could have been avoided by the student being **confident** to clearly communicate their emerging issue to an adult in a position of responsibility before it became more serious. The adults in question were teachers or educators, the child's parents, health professionals and other adults well known to the student.

While there are myriad reasons that could potentially explain why the students didn't speak up at the 'right' time, I don't think we should be dismissive of the potential gravity of the situation(s). Those of us in generations older than these teens may write it off as 'typical' of teens or 'boys' these days and suggest that 'technology' or some other faceless threat is to blame, or other similar response which absolves us of direct responsibility, but we do this at our peril.

Here at MDS we have, for several years, had a strong emphasis on promoting dialogic teaching methodology, intertwined with our broader literacy based site improvement goals. We feel we are making strong progress, but these instances tell us that there are some further hurdles to leap on this path. We know that communication skills are vital and that highly literate people tend to have greater general academic success BUT THIS IS MORE IMPORTANT THAN THAT...

Again we ask for parents to reinforce this vital skill, just as we will continue to. In classrooms our focus is on students being able to speak about their specific learning. I reckon it's worth parents having this conversation with our kids about the importance of speaking up in uncertain situations; asking questions, sharing opinions, exchanging viewpoints, taking an interest, communicating concerns with EVERYONE in our community in an appropriate manner. I don't think we should be complacent about this or merely let our kids learn the 'hard' way.

Effective oral communication skills are not merely a 'nice to have' ability that our children can get by without, rather it is an **essential** life skill that will support our kids to effectively function in **their** real-world. Let's work hard on this together for all of our kids.

Staff have recently completed a mid-term progress report for students to identify current academic progress. The reports can be accessed in the parent portal on Daymap and are in the form of a traffic light system with green reflecting that child is progressing well and is currently performing at standard or above. Orange shows that your child's learning progress is currently of concern, with red identifying that your child's learning is not yet at standard. If you do not have access to the parent portal yet, please get in contact with the school and we can help you through the registration process so you can view the reports. The document also provides an update on current attendance rates. The DfE has a goal of 95% attendance, so it would be great to see as many students as possible above this level.

We have some important dates for you to put in the diary for events later in the term. Middle School Learning Conversations will be held in Week 10 on Monday 29th March and Wednesday 31st March. The learning conversations provide an opportunity for students to discuss and reflect on their term 1 goals and overall progress this term with parents and teachers. Students in our school have been invited to take part in a survey being conducted in Term 1 2021. This letter provides key information about the survey.

Our school will participate in the Term 1 Wellbeing and Engagement Collection which will be open during Weeks 8 to 10 (Monday 15 March to Thursday 1 April 2021).

Purpose of the collection

Young people's sense of wellbeing is an important part of how they learn at school. The purpose of the survey is to seek students' views about their wellbeing and their engagement with school. Students in year levels 4 to 12 across the State will be invited to participate in the *Wellbeing and Engagement Collection*. The information collected will help the education system and broader community to support young people's health and wellbeing.

What is the survey about?

The survey asks students about their social and emotional wellbeing; school relationships and engagement and learning in school; and physical health and wellbeing and after school activities. Students' answers will be kept confidential – no one (including school staff) will use the results to identify individual students.

What is involved in project participation?

Teachers will arrange for students to undertake the survey during class time. Students will be asked if they would like to participate and will be free to withdraw at any time.

If you do not want your child to participate, please notify their care group teacher as soon as possible.

Will students' information be kept confidential?

The department takes measures to ensure students' personal information and their identities remain anonymous when participating in the survey.

What will happen if a student is distressed during or after the survey?

Whilst the survey questions are not expected to distress students, the survey includes questions that ask about topics such as students' happiness and experiences of being bullied. Teachers will inform students that:

- if they find the survey uncomfortable or distressing, they should leave the survey screen immediately
- that it is not compulsory to take part in the survey as a whole, and
- students may also skip individual survey questions if they wish.

Students who may want to speak to an adult about concerns or issues and will be supported to do so.

We are looking for the following age groups :-


Under 13 – 10-12 year olds (can be 13 but must be 12 on 1/1/2021)
