#### Minlaton District School Wins SAASLA Best Practice Award

Minlaton District School (MDS) is thrilled to announce that we have been awarded the South Australian Area School Leaders Association (SAASLA) Best Practice Award for 2025. This prestigious state-wide award recognises excellence and innovation in teaching and learning among area schools.

Our whole-school Inquiry-Based Learning initiative is driven by the vision of creating "Expert Learners" earned this honour, highlighting the amazing work of our staff and students over the past two years. This award is a wonderful external validation, but the real reward is the impact we see every day on our students and our community. The achievement is a true team effort and a celebration of the excellent learning happening at MDS, and we're excited to share the story with our parents, families, and community.

As you know we pride ourselves on being a connected school community where "every student is empowered to thrive". Our core values are Zest for Learning, Deep Understanding and Mastery, Transfer of Learning, Building Personal Capacity, Close Connections and Identity & Belonging. These core values guide everything we do and form the foundation for our award-winning project.

This year especially MDS has embraced a vision of fostering "Expert Learners". We want our students not just to absorb information, but to actively question, investigate, create and take ownership of their learning. This vision set the stage for a transformative journey in curriculum and teaching practice across the whole school.



#### The Journey to Inquiry-Based Learning Excellence

We determined in 2024 that best way to cultivate Expert Learners was through a whole-school focus on Inquiry-Based Learning (IBL) in its many forms. IBL is an approach where student's curiosity and questions drive their learning. Instead of passively receiving facts, students engage in exploring open-ended questions, solving real-world problems and pursuing projects that interest them. While elements of inquiry learning were not new to MDS, having a united, school-wide commitment to it allowed IBL to flourish across every classroom and subject area. From Reception to Year 12, all teachers committed to action - planning, trialling and refining inquiry methods together. The change has been exciting and classrooms transformed into hubs of activity and exploration. Teachers reported the visible changes in student engagement and outcomes were tangible. We observed increased enthusiasm, deeper questioning and more creative thinking from students of all ages.

It's important to note that we didn't "invent" inquiry-based learning, many great schools use it. Each teacher leveraged their personal strengths and interests (and even sometimes stepped bravely outside their comfort zones) to create unique learning experiences. This collective effort sparked significant professional growth for our educators and remarkable learning growth for our students. Our story showcases the dynamic, can-do spirit that rural area schools are known for, and it demonstrates that even a small community school can lead the way in educational best practice.

#### Inquiry in Action: Innovative Learning Across R-12

One highlight of our journey has been the variety of inquiry projects and methodologies that have flourished across year levels. During Terms 1 and 2 of 2025, teachers were encouraged to "try anything" in the realm of inquiry learning – and they certainly rose to the challenge. The following examples are drawn from our SAASLA Award Entry (§6):

- Early Years (Reception-Year 1): Play-Based Learning purposeful play used to seed inquiry.
- Upper Primary & Middle Years: Learning Matrices Gardner/Bloom inquiry matrices to provide student choice and differentiation.
- Middle Primary: Genius Hour weekly passion projects where students formulate questions, research and present findings.
- Middle Years Art: 20% Project a portion of class time dedicated to self-directed creative projects.
- Middle & Senior Years (HASS/English/HPE): Solution Fluency a structured problem-solving cycle applied across disciplines.
- Upper Primary & Middle: Entrepreneurial Investigations inquiries with an enterprise focus.
- **Upper Primary: "Become the Expert"** students select a new skill/domain, learn it independently, and share their expertise.
- Mathematics: Authentic, hands-on projects authentic maths physical projects connecting concepts with practical tasks

From playful exploration in Reception to complex problem-solving in Year 12, inquiry-based learning became a common thread tying the whole school together. It demonstrated creativity, critical thinking, communication, collaboration and effective use of technology, all in service of deeper understanding. Students were not just learning facts; they were learning how to learn.

#### **Positive Outcomes: Engaged Students, Energised Staff**

The ultimate goal of our inquiry focus was to improve student outcomes academically, socially and emotionally. While we initially expected to see the biggest impact in our 2026 data (after giving the program time to mature) we have already observed improvements in the pilot stages:

- Boosted student attitudes (pilot classrooms): +19% "Feelings about the future" +16% "Attitudes towards study/work" +15% "Motivation to improve".
- Academic growth: 2025 NAPLAN indicates more students demonstrating growth; inquiry-rich tasks and high engagement
  are supporting literacy and numeracy.
- Student engagement & agency: learners articulate their learning more clearly, ask deeper questions, and in many cases choose to continue projects during breaks; some classes report students more likely to attend on inquiry-project days (anecdotal).
- **Greater independence:** students are increasingly self-directed, less reliant on constant teacher help and more resilient when first attempts don't succeed.
- Communication, thinking and belonging: inquiry strengthens collaboration, student voice and a sense of belonging.
- Inclusivity and differentiation: scalable tasks enable all learners to access challenge and support.
- Energised staff & sustainable change: staff report higher job satisfaction and collegiality; learning is increasingly supported by AI and other technologies; teachers view IBL as a sustainable improvement aligned with curriculum requirements.

The shift to inquiry-based learning has transformed the culture of learning at MDS. Classrooms are places of discovery and joy. Students have greater voice and choice in what and how they learn, and they're developing skills that will serve them far beyond school: problem-solving, creativity, self-direction and confidence. For our teachers, seeing these outcomes has been the ultimate reward.

Winning the SAASLA Best Practice Award is not the end of this journey, it's just the beginning of an exciting new chapter for us. Our next focus area is to extend this spirit of inquiry beyond the school walls and into the community. In 2026, we plan to strengthen partnerships with local community groups, businesses, and families as part of student inquiry projects. By involving the community more directly, we hope to give our students an even greater sense of purpose and to share the joy of learning with the whole community.

For now, we want to take a moment to celebrate this achievement. Congratulations to our incredible staff for their creativity, courage, and hard work in making inquiry-based learning a success. Thank you to our students for embracing new ways of learning; your enthusiasm and achievements made this award possible.

Minlaton District School's journey with inquiry-based learning has shown that by deeds, not just words, a small school can achieve big things. We are proud to be leading by example in rural education. This Best Practice Award is a shining affirmation of what we've accomplished together. Let's all share in the pride of this moment, and look forward to even more innovative learning ahead. Go MDS!

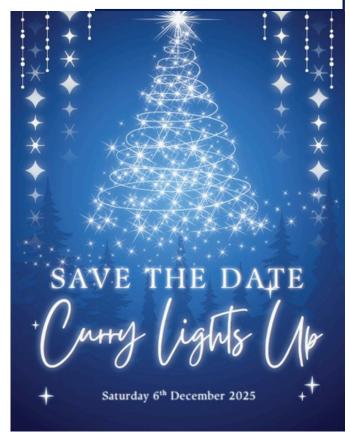

The result is a showcase of creativity, collaboration, and a zest for learning



The Year 4/5 class turned the school STEAM room into a beautiful market lane. Each business was created and run by students, to learn about economics, teamwork and customer service. The businesses had fun and creative names: Pinch Perfect Playdough, O.J.S PopCo, Supper Supply Girls, Jolly Little Sips, Croc and Rock and NEM Sweets. From playdough to sweet treats each stall had something unique to sell. Pinch Perfect Playdough sold handmade colourful playdough with mix ins to squish and squash. Croc and Rock offered sticky hands and croc charms. Super Supply Girls created fabulous personalised school ribbons and key rings. O.J.S PopCo served delicious popcorn with multiple flavours.
